#### I. REPORT SUMMARY

#### 1. PROGRESS AND ACHIEVEMENTS TO DATE

#### PROGRAM 1. INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRAM

The Terms of Reference (TOR) for the May SUT mission to Canada consisting of eleven (11) University administrators, faculty members, coordinators and support staff have been submitted to CUTC for planning and coordination.

#### PROGRAM 2. INTERNATIONAL ACADEMIC PROGRAM

During the period under review, promotional activities for the SUT-CUTC International Undergraduate Program (IUP) have been undertaken. It included printing and distribution of flyers, posters and Info Sheets; press releases and advertisements through various media; formal launching of the program with press conference, picture exhibition, dinner and preparation of SUT-CUTC IUP multivison slide presentation.

Logistical preparations for processing of applications, academic placement examinations, faculty assignments, laboratory, library and dormitory facilities are in progress.

The list of Thai candidates for the joint research and Ph.D. programs have been submitted to CUTC for consideration and placement.

#### PROGRAM 3. UNIVERSITY-INDUSTRY LINKAGE PROGRAM

The Term of Reference (TOR) for the customized training in Canada for the chief of the SUT Co-op Program has been submitted to CUTC for consideration.

A database on industries in Thailand especially those in the northeast region is now available. A questionnaire has been formulated and sent to selected industries to determine their training needs and interests. The information to be collected will serve as basis for formulating the guidelines for industry-related training courses to be organized by SUT.

#### PROGRAM 4. PROJECT MANAGEMENT

The Rector, Project Manager and the Chair of the Project Review Committee called regular meetings to monitor and coordinate the various activities and programs under the project.

The Project Coordinator represented the SUT-CUTC Project in the Workshop on Thai Canada HRD Project organized by Mr. Gerry Wright, the Project Director, at Long Beach Cha-am Hotel on 2-4 February 1995.

#### 2. PLANNED ACTIVITIES FOR THE NEXT QUARTER

The planned activities for the next quarter are summarized in Section II.2 of the Report.

#### 3. FINANCIAL REPORTS

Expenses for the promotional activities of the SUT-CUTC have been covered by SUT. The financial requirements for the next quarter were already included in the previous Quarterly Report.

#### II. PROGRESS REPORT ON PROJECT PROGRAMS, ACTIVITIES AND DELIVERABLES

#### 1. ACCOMPLISHMENTS

#### PROGRAM1: INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY-BUILDING PROGRAM

#### 1.1 Development of Academic Administration and Management Framework at SUT.

A1.11 Provision of customized training in Canada for SUT academic administrators (6 weeks each):

A four-week study tour in Canada for Dr. Weerapun Sriboonlue, Vice Rector for Planning and Development and SUT-CUTC Project Manager is being proposed.

#### Narrative:

This activity has been revised to consist of customized study tour instead of customized training. As of date, already four SUT staff had been to Canada under this program of activity. However, the participants did not utilize in full the allotted six weeks and so the total number of person-weeks used is only 18 instead of the planned 24. This permits an additional SUT administrator to visit Canada this year.

According to the agreement on the 1st PRC Meeting, Dr. Weerapun Sriboonlue, Vice Rector for Planning and Development and concurrently SUT-CUTC Project Manager is being scheduled this year for this activity. The Term of Reference (TOR) for his visit has been submitted to CUTC.

#### 1.2 Development of Academic Programs and Curricula at SUT

A1.21 Provision of customized training in Canada for 6 SUT faculty members and coordinators (12 weeks each):

A study tour for five (5) SUT faculty members and coordinators for three to four weeks is being proposed.

#### Narrative:

Similar to A1.11 this activity has been revised to consist of customized study tour instead of customized training. The period has also been reduced from 12 to 3-4 weeks. As of date, two SUT staff members had been to Canada for four weeks each. Thus, of the total 72 person-weeks (6 p x 12 wks) only 8 person-weeks (2p x4 wks) have been utilized, leaving a balance of 64 person-weeks.

In this connection, it has been suggested that one SUT staff be added to the originally remaining four (or a total or five ) persons be nominated for the study tour to Canada this year. Among them are:

- Dr. Kasem Prabriputaloong, Dean Institute of Resources Technology (for 3 weeks)
- Dr. Chaiyot Tangsathitkulchoi Chair, School of Chemical Engineering (for 3 weeks)
- Dr. Sarawut Sutijorn Chair, School of Electrical Engineering (for 4 weeks)
- Mr. Suriya Smutkupt Vice the late Dr. Roongtham Sujithamrak,
   Dean, Institute of Social Technology)
- Dr. Vorapot Khompis Senior Lecturer in Mechanical Engineering (for 4 weeks)
- 6) Staff from the Center for International Affairs (Still to be identified (for 4 weeks)

Of the five nominees, two are requesting a study tour of three weeks while all the others prefer four weeks, thus, requiring a total of 18 personweeks. This is still within the available 64 person-weeks.

The Terms of Reference (TOR) and preferred dates of each participant have been submitted to CUTC and are provided as Attachment 1.

#### 1.2 Development of Institutional Support Service us at SUT

A1.31 Provision of customized training in Canada for SUT support personnel.

#### Narrative:

There are originally four training provisions under this activity i.e.: Library Automation (2), Management Information Systems (1) and Scientific Equipment (1), each for 6 weeks or a total of 24 person-weeks. Three SUT support staffs have already undergone training for a total of 16 person-weeks since one did not use the full six weeks allotted time. There is therefore still a balance of 8 person-weeks.

During the Project Review Committee Meeting in November 1994, it was suggested that one additional SUT staff from the Center for Educational Services undergo training especially in the management of the Registrar's office; one from the Center for Computer services and two from the Center for International Affairs, a total of 16 person-weeks (4 p x 4 wks = 16 person-weeks)

The unused balance in A1.31 (8 person weeks) and A1.21 (46 person-weeks) or a total of 54 person-weeks could be utilized for this additional training. The activity would require 24 person-weeks, leaving still a balance of 26 person-weeks.

#### PROGRAM 2: INTERNATIONAL ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

#### 2.1 International Applied Science and Engineering Undergraduate Programs:

#### A2.11 Academic Program Planning and Coordination

Promotional activities of the International Undergraduate Programs in Engineering and Food Technology have been undertaken.

#### Narrative:

The Center for International Affairs in collaboration with Academic Institutions and Centers at SUT prepared the flyer, poster and Info Sheet for the International Undergraduate Program (IUP) in Engineering and Applied Science in January.

There was some delay due to unavailability of some data like tuition fees to be charged at SUT and specific deadlines for the academic calendar of IUP activities. In addition, the New Year holiday period caused additional constraints for the printers.

The flyers, posters and IUP Info Sheets became available by mid-January. Copies of them together with application forms were mailed to International Schools in Bangkok, major high schools in the country and to parents of prospective students, i.e. those working in banks, large industries/commercial establishments, embassies, and international organizations. Copies were also sent to Ministries of Education of all Southeast Asian countries. A copy of the flyer and IUP Info Sheet is provided as Attachment 2.

Press releases and TV/radio announcements were also made in February and March together with one week advertisement of the program in leading Thai and English newspapers.

SUT formally launched the program with a press conference in the morning and a dinner at Siam Intercontinental Hotel Ballroom on the 2nd of March. The occasion was graced by the presence of Dr.Krasae Chanawong, former Minister of University Affairs and presently Minister of Foreign Affairs, Mr.Thavin Praison, Minister of University of Affairs and Ms. Ingrid Knutson, CIDA and Canadian Embassy representative. They, together with Dr.Wichit Srisa-an, Rector of SUT, gave speeches or remarks during the event. A picture exhibition of SUT and CUTC was also organized at the hotel ballroom lobby and the dinner was highlighted by a multivison slide presentation on the SUT-CUTC International Undergraduate Program.

It was unfortunate that only Ryerson Polytechnic University and the Technical University of Nova Scotia responded to SUT's request for CVs and pictures of staff members to be involved in the program and for pictures of activities and scenes of their Universities.

Personal promotional visits to some International Schools in Bangkok were also undertaken by the Center for International Affairs.

At present, preparations for the logistical requirements like for placement examination, faculty assignments, laboratory, library and dormitory facilities are in progress. Attached is the program of activities and deadlines for the SUT-CUTC IUP.

#### Narrative:

The SUT Co-op Program is now in operation. The first group of international co-op program is in relation to IAESTE (International Association the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience) for the Academic Year 1995. Sixteen SUT students have already been identified as qualified to go abroad based on English language competency and high academic performance. Some of these students can therefore be considered for the SUT-CUTC Co-op Program. Request for arrangement with CUTC will be submitted soon.

A2.32 Provision of 16 weeks placement and supervision for 10 Canadian students in Thailand by SUT

#### Narrative:

The SUT Co-op Program is equally ready to welcome Canadian students (especially Graduate Students) for placement at SUT as teaching assistants (TA) especially for English language, and IUP laboratory courses. The Canadian students can also serve as Research Assistants (RA) to professors with university or external research grants. Some industries in Thailand are also willing to accept a few foreign co-op students. Negotiations with CUTC partners can therefore be initiated now.

#### PROGRAM 3: UNIVERSITY-INDUSTRY LINKAGE PROGRAM

#### 3.1 Development of Cooperative Education at SUT

A3.11 Provision of customized training in Canada for SUT Co-op Program coordinator.

As previously stated, the SUT Co-op Program is now in operation and its activities can be extended to Canada. SUT has nominated Dr. Thawatchai Teekachunhatean as Chief of Co-op Program and participant and to the SUT mission to Canada in May. The Terms of Reference (TOR) for such training has been submitted to CUTC for consideration. The implementation of activities A2.31 and A2.32 will be among the major agenda for discussion

#### 3.2 Joint University-Industry Cooperation and Training Initiatives.

#### Narrative:

Dr. Kasem Prabriputallong Dean, Institute of Resources Technology is responsible for this activity. A database of industries in Thailand especially in the northeast region where SUT is located is now available.

A questionnaire has been formulated and sent to selected companies to assess the training requirements and interests of industries in the region. The results of the analysis will be made available in the next quarterly report. It will serve as the basis for the planning of the industry-based training seminars in Thailand (A3.22)

#### PROGRAM 4. PROJECT MANAGEMENT

#### 4.3 Project Supervision and Coordination

Narrative:

The Rector, Project Manager or the Chair of the Project Review Committee called regular meetings to monitor and coordinate the various activities and programs under the project.

Mr.Gerry Wright, Project Director of the Thai Canadian HRD Project of which the SUT-CUTC Project is a component, convened a Project Managers Workshop for Lead Thai Partners at Long Beach Cha-Am Hotel, Petchburi on 2-4 February 1995.

The Workshop provided a forum for Thai linkage project partners to begin network in areas of mutual interest like environment and food technology. The discussion also allowed the participants to build upon and benefit from each other's experience in project management, institutional capacity building, fostering mutual benefits and long-term relationships. The participants considered possible indicators for monitoring and evaluating the individual projects and the entire HRD cooperation. A Workshop of Project Managers and their Canadian linkage partners is being planned for June 1995 to discuss further the above mentioned items.

SUT was represented by Dr. Ruben C. Umaly, The SUT-CUTC Project Coordinator and Director, Center for International Affairs.
